that they also might be sanctified through the truth." The word sanctified according dictionary.com means "free from sin; purify." Truth. For some, this can be a scary concept. Especially if you've been caught in a lie or for a Christian who has been asked about your thoughts and ideas on a controversial subject. I had a co-worker ask me recently what I thought about transgenderism, and I won't lie, my heart began to beat very fast. I became worried that if I spoke the truth, I would be labelled hateful, homophobic and that they would see me as only those things which I am not. I mean, look what they did to Jesus for speaking the truth, that'll make anyone's blood pump. I had to remind myself that the truth will set you free. I quietly said a quick prayer and told her that I did not agree with that way of living, but Jesus loves them just as much as he loves me and if being a Christian is to be like Christ, why should I be any different in loving them? To my surprise she politely nodded her head and told me she saw my point of view.

In today's society we often hear phrases of "speak your truth" and "be true to yourself" and while those are applicable in some ways the world often bases their truth on feelings. We know from Jeremiah 17:9 That "The heart is more deceitful than all else" so following your heart and feelings is not the greatest idea especially when it comes to claiming truth. "Confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The earnest prayer of a righteous person has great power and produces wonderful results." James 5:16 NLT

I remember a friend musing with me one day about how it would be interesting to teach a child the wrong colors from the time that they are born. Red is blue, green is yellow, and so on. Can you imagine their first day of school? Waiting at the bus stop for the big green bus. Trying to find their seat after they are told to find the blue table. Color-by-number pictures would be unique, let's say. It is difficult to navigate a real world when you believe certain things about it that are untrue. We take for granted basic assumptions about the world every day, and when those assumptions are incorrect, the impact can be significant.

Sin has a way of coloring things. Sin done *by* us and sin done *to* us. Sin is nearly impossible to quarantine. Others will be affected. When we act on our disordered desires we get caught in a kind of feedback loop. We feel ashamed for what we have done or what we have become, but we also impulsively want to hide it, only giving more power to sin. The Apostle Paul described sin as being a "law" inside of his body–rules that his body lived by (Romans 7).

We all have a few off-color things about us that we might fear will make it to the surface. And, whether we are aware of it when we are in it or not, we order our lives in ways to manage that fear and cope with that possibility. Eventually, it surfaces in maladaptive traits and habits. We don't let the conversation go certain places, because we fear what it might reveal about us. We have to save face, keep up appearances. You can do that for a time, but before too long, ignoring reality and avoiding deep connection with other people will make you into the kind of person that is hard to live with. You will find it immensely difficult to live with yourself, and you won't really do much

living at all, settling for a shadow instead of the substance, never knowing or being fully known by anyone.

The great gift of confession is that it takes the power from the secret. Those hidden things wreak havoc on our souls, but when we drop the act and confess our sins to one another, we open up windows of healing light. In part, we acknowledge the grave reality of our condition, but this is also the beginning of healing. We observe this connection between confession and healing in the letter of James. When we confess to someone the real facts of our failures, we have then provided to them the specifics needed for effective prayer. Prayer works, James makes that much clear. But we can't pray for what we don't know about. When we shine light into the dark places of our lives, we invite the prayers of the righteous person, which avails much. The reciprocal nature of the text ("for one another") suggests that the righteous person is expected to confess—you confess, and I will be the righteous one who prays, then I will confess, and you be the righteous one who prays.

In the interest of truth, the theme of this edition, we should endeavor to make our local church gatherings truthful again. It is so easy to go to church on Sunday, see the same people, have the same surface-level interactions, but I think the church of the New Testament lived much more shared lives than that. Alas, maybe it is the 21st century and times are just different, but I can't help but think that this kind of deep, meaningful connection is something desperately needed in our world today. Let's ask ourselves the question: How can we integrate confession back into the life of the church today? And hey, if you are a leader in your congregation with some influence, how about you go first?


I would like to leave you with Psalm 15.

And when he had said this, he went out again unto the Jews, and saith unto them, I find in him no fault at all." **John 18:37-38 KJV**

Truth.

It is a big word that carries a lot of weight, especially given the current state of our culture. People have been asking "what is truth" since Jesus physically walked on the earth, as we can read in the above scripture. Pilate asks a very simple, yet profound question, that many are still asking today, "What is truth?" Many will spend the sum of their lives in hot pursuit of absolute truth, while others deny its existence, choosing to rather adopt the mindset of truth being relative.

A quick Google search of the question "What is truth" will give you unlimited results in mere seconds. Thousands of articles related to the fields of philosophy, religion, and academics all attempt to answer this one question, what is truth? According to a study conducted by Barna Research, 64% of American adults believe that truth is relative to each person and their situation, while teens tipped the scales with 83% believing that moral truth depends on the circumstances.

This leads me to ask an important question, what is society without moral truth, and can our society exist and thrive without morality? When taken apart and examined in its truest form, our society does, for the most part, function by standards set by moral truth. For example, "Thou shalt not murder" is one of the 10 commandments, the 10 commandments being building blocks in the foundation of the Gospel. There are laws against murder and punishments if such a crime is committed. "You shall not steal" is another commandment that is not accepted nor tolerated in modern-day society (in most communities).

That being said, the lines began to blur dramatically a few generations back and we now find ourselves on an aggressive downward slope. Of course, this is nothing new as humanity has always struggled with practicing and living out the boundaries set by God. We have slowly devolved into a generation that is fiercely pushed to tolerate, accept, and celebrate that which is contrary to God and His Word. The push to live out your own truth rings loud and clear in the culture of today.



So to answer my previous question, yes, society can exist without absolute truth and morality, but is it a life worth living? What will be left for our children and grandchildren in the generations to come? Spiritual ruin, lawlessness, and desperate confusion lie not so far in the distance if we do not steadfastly tighten our grip on truth and morality.

As you near the end of the article, I urge you to do as Proverbs 23:23 commands "Buy the truth, and sell it not; also wisdom, and instruction, and understanding."

Contend for the truth, and never let anything or anyone take it from you. Future generations depend on this generation to remain diligent, alert, and steadfast in their morality and their knowledge of absolute truth.

On our first trip to Barcelona, Spain, we visited the famous basilica called La Sagrada Familia (the holy family). Famous architect Antoni Gaudí began designing it in 1882. Now over 140 years after its construction started, it is still unfinished. "It is the largest unfinished church in the world." The architecture is stunning. At the entrance to Sagrada Família Basilica there is an inscription in Catalan of the conversation between Jesus and Pilate. "What is Truth?" The inscription says. How ironic for Pontus Pilate to ask this question as he looked right at the Messiah who was Truth. Jesus declared in John 14:6 "I am the way and the truth and the life."

So what is truth? In this world full of internet fact-checkers, fake news and misinformation, sometimes it seems that the truth is elusive. During the pandemic, the news, and the facts about Covid-19 and the global shut down, seemed to change daily. You could be constantly glued to internet articles, and news channels only to feel like the you still weren't getting the truth. Add to that the fact that we live in a society that is embracing subjective truth. Even an individual's gender is now their own truth.

What is the objective truth? Is it a list of doctrine or verses that we can quote about salvation? Is it any factual statement? Truth isn't just our doctrinal statements, or apostolic doctrine or the "cold hard facts". The Hebrew word for truth is Emet. It's composed of 3 Hebrew letters. The first letter is Alef. It has a number value of one and represents the one and only God. If you take that letter Alef out of that word, it changes it to another word Met - and it means death. If we just take God out of truth - we only have the facts.

Before Christ came, we had the law - and the fact was we couldn't meet the demand of the law. 2 Corinthians 3:6 says, "The written law brings death, but the Spirit gives life." All that we have when we face truth without Christ is death. The fact is, we are sinners who deserve punishment. But when God was manifest in the flesh - he dealt with Death - and fulfilled the law - and now God added to death makes Truth! That's why the Bible says in John 1:17, For the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ.

Thomas Aquinas said it aptly, "Make God the beginning of truth, and everything else is illuminated." The removal of God and his Word from our society has now even caused people to question objective truths. Our world is

filled with questions and confusion. Let's not be like Pilate, and miss the answer right in front of us. The only answer to the chaos in our world is Truth, and the only truth is Jesus Christ.

Truth isn't just facts to be know, it's a person. Jesus is the truth. And because the spirit of Christ dwell in us. Truth is to be lived. Truth isn't just our doctrinal statements, or apostolic doctrine that we have some kind of a patent on. Truth is to be the filter by which every thought of our mind must pass. Here are some questions to consider if truth is active in your life.

Do I think Truth?

Phillipians 4:8 says it best, "Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things." The first attribute of our thoughts should be truth. Is what I'm thinking true according to God's Word?

Do I speak Truth?


Ephesians 4:25 says, "Therefore each of you must put off falsehood and speak truthfully to your neighbor, for we are all members of one body." We are also encouraged in the same chapter to "speak the truth in love". Truth in the absence of love can be damaging.

Am I living Truth?

In Psalm 51:6-17 we read the prayer of King David after the prophet Nathan came to him when David had committed adultery with Bathsheba. The truth of his sin was uncovered and David is pouring out his prayer to the Lord. Verse "Behold, thou desirest truth in the inward parts: And in the hidden part thou shalt make me to know wisdom. Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean: Wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow." Our prayer must constantly be that God search our deceitful hearts, and place his truth inside of us.

Do I really know Truth?

John 8:32 says, "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." That word know (*ginöskö* in Greek) is not just a mental understanding, it's to know, to recognize, and perceive...that same word in Hebrew gives us a clearer picture, which means to have a close, warm intimacy, combined with knowledge. That kind of knowing brings freedom! It's transformative.



1 Kings 2:4 (KJV) That the LORD may continue his word which he spake concerning me, saying, If thy children take heed to their way, to walk before me in truth with all their heart and with all their soul, there shall not fail thee (said he) a man on the throne of Israel.

We live in a day and age where the world is persistently spreading lies and deception in the minds of people. There are demonic spirits that attempt to influence the present generation into twisted ideologies and beliefs that breed confusion. These are all in hopes of tainting and attacking the infallible Truth of the Word of God and bringing its victims astray. A path that will lead to despondency. As a Church, we need to rise to the occasion and walk in truth when others choose otherwise.

Our society will tell you now that there is "No absolute truth". Everyone has its version. They will even say "Live your truth". It doesn't matter if what they do is against the principles of the scriptures and science. If it feels right and if no other person is hurt, then you can suit yourself. Living a life that is based purely on emotion, peer pressures and current trends will result in an unfulfilled and unsatisfied heart. But if we learn to walk upon the eternal word, we can have an assurance that our lives will be full of purpose and a sense of direction. That's why there's such a demand for being planted on a solid and unmovable foundation - God's Truth.

When King David was nearing his end of life, he gave charge to his son, the successor of the throne, Solomon. To keep and observe the commandments of the Lord, and to walk in truth and he will be successful in everything he does, wherever he goes. David shared a secret with his son on how to be successful in life and maintain an overwhelming position and glory a man can achieve. To sit on the throne and lead a nation as a king, a promise that will continue in their family and generations to come.

It's one thing to receive a promotion, but it's also another thing to keep it. King David knew that aligning our will with God's Word was the only way to handle this enormous weight and responsibility. Even an elevation can bring destruction if we don't subject ourselves to His direction. On the other hand, it also means that if Solomon continues in the ways of the Lord, then he will be able to enjoy all the privileges and everything that comes with the position and power. Truly, there are blessings, joy, comfort, peace, certainty and stability when you abide in Him.Walking in truth is a path that most people reject. Considering that it requires sacrifice, denying selfish desires and humility, choosing to glorify God rather than glorifying oneself. It's the most unappealing

journey from a carnal perspective but a distinct honour to partake for someone who's spiritually minded. Jesus knew that many people would choose the wide gate and broad way (Matthew 7:13-14). They can have care-free lives, without boundaries and accountability. Unlike the straight gate and narrow way. It may not be appealing to everyone, nor filled with grandeur, but in the end, there's a life waiting for those who go through that road willingly.

Solomon debuted his role as a leader of Israel and it was exceptional. He displayed unmatched wisdom and excellence and his fame spread throughout the nation and beyond. But the closing moments of his lifework weren't as magnificent and bright as it started. Everything went a downward spiral when he veered off from the path he was supposed to take. He started to neglect the instructions given by his father. In the end, he realized "all is vanity and vexation of spirit" (Ecclesiastes 1:14)
